In the Biography by Walter Dean Myers, the stages of Malcolm X's life are described. As a young person, Myers says, "...he (Malcolm) understood that the talents he possessed were valued in his schoolmates." Myers goes on to explain that when a teacher asked Malcolm what he would like to be when he grew up, Malcolm responded that he would like to be a lawyer. Myers explains in his Biography that, "The teacher said to him (Malcolm) that it was not practical for him to be a lawyer because he was black."

Myers describes Malcolm's resilience, "Malcolm's life was about growth, about the intensely changing man that moved from thievery to honesty, from being a racial separatist to searching for true brotherhood and from atheism to Islam."
